



# Praeludium

Of interest to many of you will be Jan Liebermann's Dupré project, which you can view on YouTube. Jan also has a Facebook page with information.

He showcases the two sets of Dupré's Preludes and Fugues, Opp. 7 and 36. The Opus 7 set is well-known, and for many represents the top end of the French virtuoso organ repertoire. For those who find these a walk in the park, the much less-played (and less-known) Opus 36 set contains some of Dupré's most technically complex and challenging writing. For good measure, he adds two of the three Esquisses, Opus 41. Happy watching and listening!

## News



It is with great sadness that we learned of the death of **Nicolas Kynaston** on 26<sup>th</sup> March 2025.

His funeral took place at St Ethelreda's Church, Ely, on Friday 25<sup>th</sup> April.

Nicolas was one of the world's most important organists, who will be particularly remembered for his impeccable technique and enormous skill in registration – especially in French and German Romantic music.

He became organist of Westminster Cathedral whilst still at student of Ralph Downes at the RCM. He had previously been a

chorister there, and at the age of 15 won an Italian government scholarship to study with the virtuoso Fernando Germani in Rome.

On April 12th, our member and RCO accredited teacher, Marilyn Harper, gave a workshop to eight or so members of the Society at Christ's Chapel in Dulwich, using the magnificent 3-manual Drake organ. The topic was the New Oxford Organ Method – an organ study book written by Anne Marsden Thomas and Frederick Stocken (another of the Society's members).

### Andrew Chadney writes:

This communication may be of interest to SSLSO members.

'It is a pleasure to announce the pdf digital sheet music related to the following information:

Madrid's National Library holds numerous old Spanish musical treasures, some of them of great antiquity. Amongst them, a collection of four sheet-music volumes for keyboards, all handwritten, dating back to the 18 century. Their titles are: Music Flowers, Delightful garden of soft music flowers, Pleasant orchard of various music flowers and again, Music flowers. It's a compilation of the monk and organist Franciscan Catalan Antonio Martin and Coll (c. 1680 – 1734), who practised as organist and professor at San Diego Church in Alcala de Henares and later on as lead organist at Madrid's San Francisco el Grande Basilica.

Martin and Coll ordered copies to be made containing keyboard sheet-music from the 17 century up to the first decades of the 18 century, mainly for organ and liturgical purposes. Other non-strictly liturgical pieces are included, for more secular traditional instruments, such as the harpsichord. Genoveva Galvez, an outstanding harpsichord player, teacher and musicologist is responsible for this edition, promoted by the San Dámaso Arts and History Academy of the Ecclesiastical Province of Madrid. As a harpsichord player and scientist she stood out for her search for the authentic sources and historical documents. Professor Galvez is a guarantee of fidelity to Martin and Coll manuscripts, being also relevant to her own musical contributions to the here published repertory. Not in vain, Genoveva Galvez has lectured at Baroque Harpsichord and Music, in Madrid, and also at the prestigious International Music Courses in Santiago de Compostela. Resulting in a great experience for Spanish keyboard music from which it has left an unquestionable testimony in numerous recordings from that time. Thanks to this publication we trust that the great Franciscan organist's legacy will be popularised reaching the most secluded places as a sign of an increasing need for spirituality

<u>Johannes</u> is the newly appointed Royal Court Organist of Stockholm, Sweden. He won First Prize and the Bach Prize at the 2024 Canadian International Organ Competition.

Johannes holds degrees from the Royal College of Music in Stockholm, the Conservatoire de Paris and the Staatliche Musikhochschule in Stuttgart. His teachers include Olivier Latry, Nathan Laube, Louis Robilliard, Michel Bouvard, Thierry Escaich and Mathias Kjellgren. He has spent five years at the Cathedral of Vasteras as Associate Organist, and is currently teaching organ interpretation at the Lilla Akademien in Stockholm.

## Anne Page

Anne was born in Perth, Australia.

She studied with Marie Claire-Alain in France, and with Peter Hurford in Cambridge – teaching as his deputy at the Royal Academy of Music for several years.

Anne is playing music by JS Bach and Lionel Rogg.

Her concert starts with a famous (infamous!) pedal flourish – the Prelude and Fugue in D by Bach.

The Lionel Rogg pieces are bathed within his extraordinary experience of performing and yet his original voice shines out.

## Jan Liebermann



Recognized as one of the most promising young artists in the organ world, <u>Jan Liebermann</u> has earned widespread acclaim through numerous prestigious awards and performances in esteemed venues. He will be starting this recital with the monumental Introduction, Passacaglia & Fugue by Healey Willan - a tour de force making great demands on both organist and organ.

Both the above recitals will be given on the <u>lewis</u> organ, which was built for the Church of Saint Mark, Battersea Rise in 1874.

## Luca Myers



Luca was formerly the Senior Organ Scholar at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge where he is a prize-winning history undergraduate. Whilst a scholar, he studied organ performance under Stephen Farr and Jeremiah Stephenson. Luca accompanied three choral premieres, as well as giving the premiere of a further three organ works. He also accompanied the college choir's first BBC Radio 3 Choral Evensong broadcast for many years.

Luca is a zealous recitalist, appearing most notably in the 2023 summer celebrity series at Selby Abbey, as well as at Sheffield Cathedral, and various colleges across Cambridge. With the choir at Sidney, Luca has benefitted from international tours, and has performed in venues such as St Thomas' Church, New York City, the National Cathedral in Washington and Westminster Abbey.
